Dept. of Public Works – I would like to thank the Dept. of Public Works for an outstanding job this past winter. It is a difficult task because of their full-time responsibilities elsewhere to keep the Village streets and properties clear of snow. Job well done!

Emergency Government is working hard to put a procedure in place if or when an emergency occurs. They have had meetings with both Washington and Ozaukee County Emergency Government Officials.

We have had complaints regarding dogs at large within the Village of Newburg limits. This is a summary of the ordinance concerning this issue.

Ordinance 12.08 – Regulation and Licensing of Dogs. It is unlawful for any person in the Village to own, harbor or keep any dog more than five months of age without complying with the regulations of this ordinance.

1. Dogs must be licensed.
2. Rabies vaccination required.
3. Dogs are not allowed to run at large.
4. Pursue vehicles on streets.
5. Molest passers by or assault or attach any person without being provoked.
6. Dogs should not bark or howl to the annoyance of any person or persons.

The above again, is just a summary of the ordinance and enforced by our Law Officers. If you would like information on the complete ordinance, please contact the Village Clerk at 675-2160.

The Garden Detective

Ask a Master Gardener...

Barbara McHugh

March 23, 2006

This is the first in a series of mysteries that I will attempt to solve for the avid gardener. I work with the Yard and Garden Line at the University Extension Office in Port Washington and this column is a community outreach program sponsored by the Ozaukee Master Gardeners.

"The Case of the Scarlet Soil"

Our first case came to me in person rather than by mail. It took two weeks of research and "digging" to solve this riddle.

QUESTION:

Mike tends a garden in the Little Kohler area, over the years it has produced beautifully. This last year his soil turned to red clay and the plants did not thrive. He wanted to know why the soil changed and why his plants are not growing. Mike had told me that the only thing he had amended his soil with was wood ashes and chemical fertilizer.

After checking further I discovered that he heats his home with wood and he put ALL of the ashes on his garden!... He had done this over many years.

ANSWER:

The question was emailed to Stanley W. Buol, Distinguished Professor Emeritus, who has a BS, MS and Ph.D. in Soil Science from UW Madison. He retired from and works out of the North Carolina State University, but because he grew up here in Wisconsin he is the expert that I trusted with this "sticky" question.

RED COLOR:

Professor Buol says "Red color in soil is most often from the presence of iron oxides... Ash contains small amounts of iron that may over time tend to increase red color."

CLAY SOIL:

Professor Buol and his colleague Dean Hesterberg concluded: "The major problem is probably associated with the rather long term application of wood ashes. Wood ashes raise the soil pH and this would cause a break down of soil structure and cause the soil to 'feel' and act like there was more clay."

PLANTS NOT THRIVING:

According to the professor "one can not see most soil chemistry so you very definitely need to have a soil test to be certain" "The guess is that there is a lack of plant available nitrogen due to the added carbon in the ash creating a very high carbon nitrogen ration."

CONCLUSION:

After lots of discussion about the quality of the soil in Mike's garden he decided to abandon the soil that he has and to create above ground beds that he will fill with new soil that will be hauled in from a source that makes a garden mix of top soil, sand and organic compost.

Professor Buol says "we think that planting on a raised bed would be a good idea." The soil could have been saved with a lot of work, but Mike has always wanted to try a raised bed garden and this is his chance to do this.

If he had tested his soil he would have understood that "more is not always good" and he would have used the recommended amount of ash for the size of his garden.. A note of caution here, just because Mike is bringing in good soil for his beds he will still need to amend the soil each year with compost and organic matter.

TEST YOUR SOIL !!!

Many Master Gardeners have confessed that they do not test their soil as long as the garden is thriving. When you are starting a new garden or trying to grow a plant with special needs like blueberries it is recommended that you test your soil. If you are just beginning to have problems, that is another good time to test. You can obtain a soil test kit **FREE** from the Ozaukee County Agriculture Department in Port Washington. Call **262-284-8288** and they will mail you a packet. The packet includes a sample bag, instructions for obtaining your soil sample and a pamphlet on the services and fees for analysis. The cost is about \$15.00 for a Home and Garden Test. The web site for the soil lab is <http://uwlab.soils.wisc.edu> for more information.

I received a very scary email from a friend of mine who forwarded a warning about mulch coming from hurricane damaged areas of the south containing termites.

(There followed a long email with a very scary story indeed, about the threat to our homes here in Wisconsin from cheap mulch that will be for sale in national home improvement stores, etc.)

ANSWER:

This email was forwarded to Ozaukee County agent Dan O'Neil asking, asking, can this be true? He sent this press release.

The mystery of this question was solved on the spot!

Debunking the Urban Mulch Myth!

Rumors of Termite-infested Mulch Are Not True

Release: March 7, 2006

MADISON- A message circulating by electronic mail and the internet warning consumers about the risk of buying termite-infested wood mulch is not true, emphasizes state agriculture officials. An email warns consumers to be very careful about buying "cheap" wood mulch this spring and summer from national home improvement stores because the mulch might be infested with Formosan termites. The email claims that hurricane damaged trees from the Gulf coast have been turned into mulch and the trees were infested with termites.

"We've checked with our counterparts in Louisiana and the email is not accurate," said Secretary Rod Nilsestuen, Wisconsin Dept. of Agriculture. "The Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry put quarantines in place last fall

following the hurricanes to prevent the spread of Formosan termites... We have multiple state and federal agencies working together to ensure the quarantine...." "Our own department insect specialists have said it's **very unlikely that termites would survive the mulching process plus the Formosan termites wouldn't survive in our colder temperatures.**" Nilsestuen said. "Once the snow clears, Wisconsin consumers can purchase wood mulch and feel confident that the mulch is free of termites."

So, dear gardeners, with the mulch myth cleared up enjoy spring fever with no fear of termites, and whatever you do please spare the wood ashes!

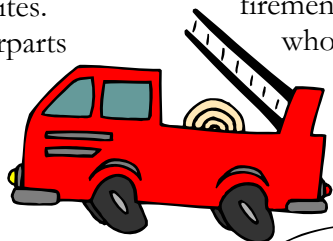

She was rescued from the Katrina hurricane and needs a quiet setting in which to recuperate from some medical issues.

Enjoy the flowers, but please do not pick any. The next person hiking the trail will be able to enjoy them, too. Please, stay on the trails. Your input is a valued commodity that should be used both by the Planning Commission and the Village Board.
