Everyone have a fun filled summer and with all the activities that occurs, BE SAFE.

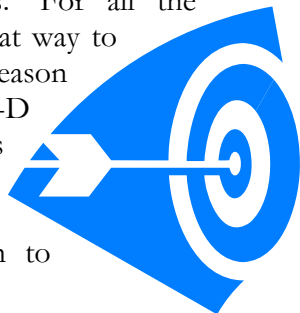

The Newburg Sportsmen's Club is fully engaged in their summer activities. Trap shooting is running on Tuesday evenings with 20 teams competing. Anyone that would like to try shooting trap or just practice before the fall hunting seasons is welcome. Open shooting times are available from 5:30 - 7:00 PM and after 8:00 PM. Just bring your shotgun and ammo and ask for information at the clubhouse. The league runs through August and there is often an abbreviated fall league in September. Additional weekend open shoots may also be offered; watch for flyers.

Summer 3-D archery league runs on Thursdays. This year there are over 40 teams participating in the 28 target field/woods placements. For all the local bow hunters, a great way to practice before archery season opens is to shoot at 3-D targets. The club utilizes both Rinehart and McKenzie 3-D animal targets. We have open to



the public shoots planned for June 24th. July 22nd., and August 26th. between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. Food and refreshments are always available for purchase. How do you keep sharp through the winter months? Think about our winter archery leagues. We offer adult league shooting Monday through Friday nights and youth league on Saturdays beginning in January.

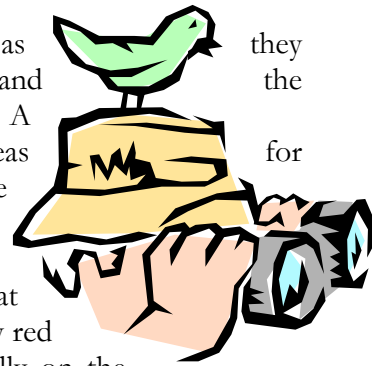

Finches -gold, purple and house are at the sunflower seed, joined on occasion by a tiny red squirrel. Bight orange orioles are the grape jelly on the deck railing, Humming birds at the sugar water. There's a busy barn swallow's nest under the deck and at least two boxes of blue birds!



The increased number of phone calls we receive from folks planning their vacations. June - August seem to be the favorite months for travel in this area of Wisconsin. Although Welcome, HOME B&B is designed to meet the needs of people living with disability, our overnight accommodations are open to the public.

The Porta-Potty returns - and it's a BIG one. For your convenience we make this amenity available at the edge of the trail from April - October.

The wheelchair friendly trail through the woods and around the prairie, the wheelchair accessible Porta-Potty, picnic tables and benches are all paid for and maintained by Welcome, House Of Modification Examples Inc. - a nonprofit organization operated entirely by volunteers.

Projects that have been completed range from installing a drop ceiling to pulling clover from the prairie, to computer lessons (thank you Becca) and minor home maintenance, planning a weekend craft fair, baking for the bake sale, painting the carport, building benches. reupholstering chairs... The Welcome, HOME grounds are not public land. However, we are VERY willing to share with you. All we ask in return is please be courteous of others by following **a few simple rules. These courtesies will ensure everyone's safety and enjoyment.**

No roller blades, skates, bikes allowed on the trails. These create ruts on the walking surface - a danger for people who have a visual impairment or walk with the assistance of a walker, crutches and canes.

Leave your dogs at home, please! Yes, you will see dogs on the trail. Some of our guests have guide or service dogs with them. These dogs are vital to their owner's lifestyle and accompany them everywhere! And, my dog lives at Welcome, HOME, so, this is her yard.

While fun to watch in the wild, we don't want to attract any more raccoons than we already share the woodland with. Bring a picnic, but please, take all of your litter home with you!

Enjoy the flowers, but please do not pick any. The next person hiking the trail will be able to enjoy them, too.

Please, stay on the trails. You'll be glad you do - the woods is LOADED with POISON IVY.

We thank you for your neighborly understanding and cooperation.

Dept. of Public Works

Lawn and Tree Maintenance

Ordinance 10.03(7a)(b) requires that turf grasses on all Village lots of 4 acres or less be maintained at a height not exceeding 4 inches. Ordinance 10.05(5) requires that tree limbs be trimmed to a height of at least 10 feet over a public sidewalk and 15 feet over a street or other public place. If a citation is issued for a violation, and the violation is not cured within the time specified, the Village may cure the violation and charge the cost to the property owner. It's in the interest of all of us to keep the Village in a neat, orderly and attractive condition to make this a pleasant place to live and to enhance everyone's property values.

Weed Control

Ordinance 10.09 provides: "No owner or occupant of any lot or parcel shall allow such property to become overgrown with any weeds or grass so as to constitute a public nuisance". Every person is required by law to destroy all noxious weeds and other growths of vegetation on land in the Village which he/she owns, occupies or controls. If the owner fails to abide by this ordinance, 14 days after being notified by the Village of Newburg, the owner and/or occupant will be subject to fines or mitigation by the Village at the owner's expense. Again, for more information, please contact the Village Clerk.

Garbage Collection & Recycle

The municipal garage will be open from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon on the second and fourth Saturday of the month to village residents, to accept yard waste and waste oil for recycling. Please refer to the sign at the gate for acceptable and unacceptable items. Waste tires may be accepted after the purchase of a permit from the office of the Village Clerk during regular Village Hall business hours. The fee is \$10 per tire.

Check the Ozaukee County Clean Sweep announcements for information on disposal of hazardous items at the Port Washington facility. There is a fee for this service.

The 4th Saturday of each month Public Works will go through pick up cut brush and branches that you have placed at the curbside. They need to be placed on the curbside by 7 a.m. and should be in 4-6 foot lengths.

Large items may be disposed of at the Village Garbage and Recycling contractor after you make arrangements. Contact Veolia directly at 800-387-0949 to arrange for you to take it to their facility at 803 N. River Road OR, Contact Bath Recycling in Kewaskum at 262-334-0705 and ask them what their current arrangements are. You may in fact collect a fee for taking it to them depending upon the current market conditions for the items you are disposing.

Remember that Garbage and Recycling must be placed curbside by 7:00 am on Friday mornings and that the Village Ordinance prohibits it from being placed curbside more than 24 hours in advance of that time. If you expect to be gone or otherwise unable to set out your garbage the day before pickup, please try to arrange for a friend or neighbor to do it for you rather than setting it out several days early.

We will provide dumpster service again this year at the municipal yard for the disposal of land fill acceptable items such as furniture, carpeting, toys, small amounts of construction material, televisions, box springs & mattresses. As before, hazardous materials are prohibited as well as appliances, dirt, sod, grass clippings, concrete, rocks, bricks, iron or tires. The municipal yard will be open from 9 am to noon on Saturdays and from 5 pm to 7 pm on Wednesdays from September 30 to October 28.

The Village of Newburg was successful in securing a recycling grant from the Department of Natural Resources for 2007 and we received a check for \$4,000 in mid-May to help offset the cost of recycling services. Part of the reason for our success has been the cooperation of our citizens in supporting the recycling effort. Those efforts are appreciated and help all of us keep our local taxes down.

Street lights

If you notice that your street light is out or is constantly on, you can call the WE Energies at (800) 242-9137 to report this, or you can go to their website at www.we-energies.com and go to residential and then on the right side of the page to "Report a Streetlight Outage". There is a tag or metal plate near the base of each street light pole. This pole number is helpful to WE-Energies in identifying the light you are reporting.
