From the President's Desk

Once again the summer is coming to an end. Trees will be turning their bright colors and all the summer gardening tools will be put away for another year.

The Personnel and Finance committee will be going over the budget figures submitted by the various committees for 2008. Among items to be reviewed is the hiring of a full time deputy clerk which has been approved by the board, cost relating to the purchase and instillation of a standby generator at the village hall.

With in the next 2 to 5 years, there will be village infrastructure improvements dealing with Franklin, Main and Congress Drive. We have not approached this aggressively because we are waiting for Washington County to advise us when they will be doing work on Main street which is a county highway. We have to be prepared to act on whatever improvements the village considers at that time. Time frame from the county is 20-09 however, as always, this is subject to change.

Remember, as winter approaches, there will be enforcement of our winter park ordinance. These hours will go into affect November 1, 2007 to April 1, 2008. For more information, call the village clerk referencing ordinance 7.07 (262-675-2160).

All our committees continue to work hard. Parks Committee is getting things put away for the winter, Law Enforcement continues to serve the village in keeping it safe and enforcing state and local laws, DPW is getting ready for the winter months and the Planning Commission is working for the future growth of OUR community. All the committees are working on finalizing their budgets to present to the Personnel and Finance Committee.

I again as in the past, urge the citizens of the Village of Newburg to attend Board meetings and committee meetings to keep yourself informed. I will continue to have my office hours the 2nd and 4th Fridays of the month unless posted otherwise. Everyone enjoy the fall.

Holy Trinity Fall Festival

Bonfire

On Saturday, October 27th there will be a bon fire in Newburg Firemen's Park starting at 7 p.m. They are now collecting brush for their pile. Please no glass or nails or garbage. Please adhere to this as clean-up becomes a real problem if there are nails and glass in the brush pile.



Snow Emergency Parking

From November 1st to April 1st, except on Main Street (CTY. MY) parking shall be permitted only on the even numbered sides of the streets on even-numbered dates as of 11 p.m. the previous night to 6 a.m. the following morning and on odd numbered dates as of 11 p.m. the previous night to 6 a.m. the following morning. Violations of this ordinance will result in a \$25 ticket. If the vehicle has not been moved within 24 hours, the vehicle may be towed away and the owner will be responsible for towing (\$55) and storage costs. The vehicles will be towed to Goeden's Auto Body in St. Michael's.

Public Works Update

Garbage Collection & Recycle

The municipal garage will be open from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon on the second and fourth Saturday of the month to village residents, to accept brush and waste oil for recycling. Please refer to the sign at the

gate for acceptable and unacceptable items. Waste tires may be accepted after the purchase of a permit from the office of the Village Clerk during regular Village Hall business hours. The fee is \$10 per tire.

Check the Ozaukee County Clean Sweep announcements for information on disposal of hazardous items at the Port Washington facility. There is a fee for this service.

The 4th Saturday of each month Public Works will go through pick up cut brush and branches that you have placed at the curbside. They need to be placed on the curbside by 7 a.m. and should be in 4-6 foot lengths.

Large items may be disposed of at the Village Garbage and Recycling contractor after you make arrangements. Contact Veolia directly at 262-334-5618 to arrange for you to take it to their facility at 803 N. River Road OR, Contact Bath Recycling in Kewaskum at 262-334-0705 and ask them what their current arrangements are. You may in fact collect a fee for taking it to them depending upon the current market conditions for the items you are disposing.

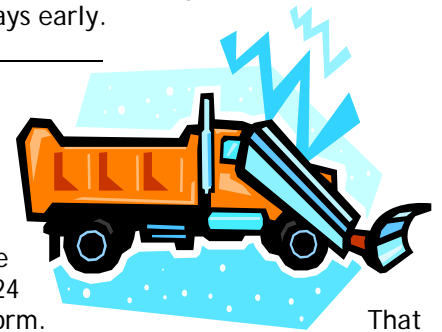
We will provide dumpster service again this year at the municipal yard for the disposal of land fill acceptable items such as furniture, carpeting, toys, small amounts of construction material, televisions, box springs & mattresses. As before, hazardous materials are prohibited as well as appliances, dirt, sod, grass clippings, concrete, rocks, bricks, iron or tires. The municipal yard will be open from 9 am to noon on Saturdays and from 5 pm to 7 pm on Wednesdays from September 30 to October 28.

Remember that Garbage and Recycling must be placed curbside by 6:00 am on Friday mornings and that the Village Ordinance prohibits it from being placed curbside more than 24 hours in advance of that time. If you expect to be gone or otherwise unable to set out your garbage the day before pickup, please try to arrange for a friend or neighbor to do it for you rather than setting it out several days early.

Snow Clearing from Sidewalks

Chapter 8.06 of the Municipal Code requires that the owner of each property in the Village shall clear the sidewalk abutting that property, to the full width of the sidewalk, within 24 hours after the cessation of a snowstorm.

That includes opening access to the crosswalk on corner lots. Cooperation with this was less than desirable, particularly along Main Street. The ordinance provides penalties for failure to clear these walkways and allows the Public Works Department to summarily clear them and bill the cost of clearing to the property owner. Downtown businesses depend on their customers being able to access their establishments and it is important that all of them cooperate with each other to keep access open. This is a safety issue, particularly for our younger and elderly residents and a potential liability issue for property owners. Please try to make arrangements to be sure this is done as promptly as possible.



Snowmobile Trails

Snowmobile season is right around the corner and HOPEFULLY - the prediction is for lots of snow. The trails are usually open if there is 6 inches of snow or more. For the hot line, please call 334-6061 to see if the trails are open or not. Please observe the trail boundaries and don't go outside them. People grant the club permission to ride the trails - don't abuse this. The carbides on the new snowmobiles are very damaging to village sidewalks and ordinances providing for a \$300 fine will be enforced against those who operate on the sidewalk. Please keep the trails through the village open and don't abuse this privilege.

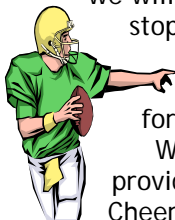
