Collection Day - On Saturday, April 18th from 9:00am - 1:00pm there will be a free medicine collection day at St. Joseph's Hospital Campus at 3200 Pleasant Valley Road, West Bend. Acceptable items will be prescription and over-the-counter medication (pills, liquids and inhalers). Do NOT bring illegal drugs, biohazardous material needles, sharps, household hazardous waste or medical equipment.

Medications that are flushed down the toilet or poured down the sink eventually end up in the environment, adversely affecting fish and other aquatic wildlife. It's even more tragic when children take their parents' medications and take them and/or share them with friends.

Help protect our children and the environment by turning in old medications and letting the county dispose of them properly.

Street construction projects

The Village Board has awarded the \$524,057.42 bid to Heartland Construction, Inc. for phase I of the downtown street reconstruction.

This phase will involve Division Street from Salisbury Street west to the Union Cemetery, and Franklin Street from Main Street south to Hwy 33. They hope to begin work around the second half of April after completion of utility relocation by WE Energies.

Residents will have limited access to their properties at times when concrete work is underway. Cars need to stay off of concrete for seven days to allow it to set properly. The two times it will occur are when the curb & gutter is being installed and again when the sidewalk is being installed. Residents will be allowed to park in the street during that time. Notice will be given by our inspector 24 to 48 hours prior to the concrete work being done.

Otherwise, residents will have full access to their properties, but the streets will be closed to through traffic. It is a violation of state law to travel as through traffic on a street closed to through traffic and is enforceable by the Newburg Police Department. Excessive traffic during construction creates unnecessary dust for the residents along the street and presents a hazard to construction crews and equipment.

The engineer supervising this project for Bonestroo will be Mike Brofka. His

mobile number is (262) 617-6776. He can be contacted once construction starts. Until then, contact Matt Bednarski with any concerns at (262) 643-9016. If you have a specific question such as the location of your driveway, etc., contact Bonestroo to discuss the issue. If you would like to contact the construction company to discuss possible work on your property in conjunction with the street project, the Bonestroo engineer can arrange a contact with the appropriate sub-contractor for a quote.

Street Right of Ways

Spring is coming and everyone is getting ready to plant shrubs, trees, etc. Please remember, no obstructions are permitted in the “right of way” of the village streets. If you have any questions regarding the right of ways in the village, please contact the village hall at 675-2160.

Emerald Ash Borer Infestation

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection will begin a series of workshops for municipal foresters in mid August to early September. These workshops will include identification, removal and disposal of infested trees. It will be of value to the Village of Newburg in that D.P.W. labor will not be needed to remove the trees from municipal property, and that will save us some money.

For property owners within the village, infested trees taken down from your property may be handled the same way as other brush. See the section on brush pickup later in this newsletter. If you wish to dispose of the wood yourself and have no other way to dispose of it without violating the quarantine rules, you may contact the Newburg Pallet Shop on Hawthorne Drive. Kettle Moraine Hardwoods, 5261 Aurora Rd, Hartford, 644-8119, bob@kmhardwoods.com will also accept infested wood and they are located within the quarantine area. They will also offer a 30 yard roll-off box for large quantities of wood.

Garbage Collection & Recycle

The municipal yard will be open from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon on the second and fourth Saturday of the month to village residents, to accept yard waste and waste oil for recycling. Please refer to the sign at the gate for acceptable and unacceptable items. Waste tires may be accepted after the purchase of a permit from the office of the Village Clerk during regular Village Hall business hours. The fee is \$10 per tire.

Check the Ozaukee County Clean Sweep announcements for information on disposal of hazardous items at the Port Washington facility. Complete information is at <http://www.co.ozaukee.wi.us/hhw/index.htm> There is a fee for this service and it is available year around to both Ozaukee County and Washington County residents.

Washington County will conduct its annual Clean Sweep Program on September 26 and 27, 2008 at the Washington County Vehicle Maintenance & Storage Facility at 900 Lang St in West Bend. Hours are 8:00 AM to Noon on both days. Lists of accepted and unaccepted items are available by calling the Clean Sweep Hotline number, 262-335-4810 or by visiting <http://www.co.washington.wi.us/lcd>.

Personal computers and cell phone may be recycled through the Volunteer Center of Washington County. More information is available at <http://www.volunteernow.net> or by calling 262-338-8256 for programs offered year around.

Why should you recycle Compact Fluorescent Lights?

As energy-efficient lighting becomes more popular, it is important that we dispose of the products safely and responsibly. Proper recycling ensures the benefits of CFLs while properly managing the disadvantages.

Compact fluorescent lights contain trace amounts (an average of 5 mg) of mercury vapor -- it's what makes the bulbs energy efficient -- an amount the size of the period at the end of this

sentence. Because they contain mercury, the bulbs should be disposed of properly; ideally recycled.

It's important to know that CFLs are safe to use and pose no danger when used properly. More information regarding mercury in CFLs, including proper disposal options and what to do if a bulb breaks, can be found in the fact sheet below.

Where can I recycle my Compact Fluorescent Lights?

Focus on Energy has partnered with the world's largest environmental service company to offer a solution. Focus representatives are providing interested retailers with recycling containers as part of a new, no-cost CFL recycling program for their customers.

<http://www.focusonenergy.com/Resources/Find-a-Retailer.aspx> to find retailers participating in the CFL recycling program. Choose 'CFL Recycling' as the store type in the drop down box. You can still recycle your bulb even if there are no retailers partnering with Focus on Energy in your area.

EPA recommends that consumers take advantage of available local recycling options for compact fluorescent light bulbs. Consumers can contact their local municipal solid waste agency directly, or visit www.epa.gov/bulbrecycling or www.earth911.org to identify local recycling options.

Brush Pickup

The last Saturday of each month Public Works will go through pick up cut brush and branches that you have placed at the curbside. They need to be placed on the curbside by 7 a.m. and should be in 4-6 foot lengths, neatly stacked, all branches aligned the same way. Larger branches or trunks must be cut to less than 50 pounds for each piece.

Large, non hazardous items may be disposed of at the Village Garbage and Recycling contractor after you make arrangements. Contact Veolia directly at 262-334-5618 to arrange for you to take it to their facility at 803 N. River Road.

If your items are recyclable – appliances, etc you may want to check the following recycling companies for the current rates they will pay for these items:

Recycling: Why do we do it?

Because state law and municipal ordinances require it, and fines may be assessed for mixing recyclable items with garbage destined for landfill.

What do we gain from it?

We receive more state grants as the ratio of recyclables to garbage increases.

What do we lose by not doing it?

Our state grant is decreased.

Our income is decreased.

Our property taxes (rent) are increased to make up the difference.

Our cost of garbage collection goes up due to the increased volume.

All recyclables are to be placed in your recycling container. If you do not have a container or yours needs replacing, one may be purchased at the Village Hall for \$10.00.

Remember that Garbage and Recycling must be placed curbside by 6:00 am on Friday mornings and that the Village Ordinance prohibits it from being placed curbside more than 24 hours in advance of that time. If you expect to be gone or otherwise unable to set out your garbage the day before pickup, please try to arrange for a friend or neighbor to do it

for you rather than setting it out several days early.

Street lights

If you notice that your street light is out or is constantly on, you can call the WE Energies at (800) 242-9137 to report this, or you can go to their website at www.we-energies.com and go to residential and then on the right side of the page to “Report a Streetlight Outage”. There is a tag or metal plate near the base of each street light pole. This pole number is helpful to WE-Energies in identifying the light you are reporting.

And, our regular Wednesday Retired Guys Volunteer Group will be glad to have these tasks removed from their perpetual "TO DO "List.

While the Welcome, HOME grounds - woods and prairie - are not public land we are VERY willing to share this inviting outdoors space with others. All we ask in return is that as you enjoy yourselves please be courteous of others who will come behind you.

Your thoughtfulness will be appreciated not only by folks who live in the area but also by people who come to visit Newburg from across the country. This includes guests staying at the Welcome, HOME Bed and Breakfast as well as Geocachers who are just passing through.

Geocaching is an outdoor treasure-hunting game. Participants use a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver to locate containers (called "geocaches" or "caches") anywhere in the world. There are two caches located on the Welcome, HOME grounds. This might explain why you at times see people walking through the woods looking lost...

When you are on the Welcome, HOME grounds please respect the following very **simple rules**. This will ensure everyone's safety and enjoyment.

1. No roller blades, skates, bikes allowed on the trail. These create an uneven walking surface, which is especially dangerous for

people who have a visual impairment or those who walk with the assistance of a walker, crutches and canes.

2. Leave your pets, especially dogs, at home, please. You may see dogs on the trail. These are guide or service dogs that accompany their owners everywhere!

3. While raccoons are fun to watch in the wild, we don't want to attract any more of them than we already have. Bring a picnic to eat at one of our tables, but please, take all of your litter home with you! And, maybe a little that someone else left behind...

4. Enjoy the flowers, but please do not pick!

5. DO stay on the trails. You'll be glad you do. This way you'll avoid the POISON IVY and prickly ash.
