Fritz Falkner Park - a grateful thanks to the Falkner Family for their recent very generous donation to the Village of a planter and bench in memory of Marie Falkner. Come out and enjoy and evening sitting by the river. These items will give our residents years of pleasure in memory or Marie.

Recycling - the village's recycling center will continue to be open until October 31 on Wednesdays from 5 - 7 P.M. and Saturdays from 9 - 12 A.M. at the maintenance building on Municipal Drive. The open dumpster is there for your use. However, we do prohibit the disposal of paint, electronics, batteries and tires. Please do not abuse the system by disposing of these prohibited items.

Brush Pick Up - residential roadside brush pick up will end the fourth Saturday in October just prior to the community bonfire on Halloween night.

Village Code - there were two recent changes to the village's code of ordinances. The first now allows dogs in village owned parks (please note: Fireman's Park is NOT a village owned park) provided they are restrained at all times on adequate leashes not greater than 10 feet in length and provided that the person in charge of the animal, properly disposes, in a sanitary manner, of any excrement deposited by such animal on both public and private property. The second change makes it unlawful to take, catch, trap, kill or pursue any fish or other aqua life form; to swim in any public pool of water; to ice skate or go upon the ice in any public pool of water; or to operate a boat, canoe, kayak or other floatation device on any public pool of water in Grotelueschen President's Park. This second set of restrictions is necessary understanding that the pond at the village's new park is an overflow detention pond designed and constructed with materials strictly to handle the detention of water off village streets. It was not designed and built for recreational use. You will hear more about possible future development at this park in the next newsletter.

Dog Licensing: All dogs must be registered per State Statute 174. You have from December 15 through March 31 each Year to obtain a Dog License without penalties. As of April 1 of each year, any dogs licensed after that date will be charged a \$25.00 late fee by the Village of Newburg. The late fee will be charged per dog. Exception is if the dog is less than 5 months old, no late fee is assessed. Further State penalties apply if determined noncompliant.

The Village Hall is open Monday through Friday from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. Applications may be picked up at the Village Hall. Completed applications can be mailed to the Newburg Village Hall, P.O. Box 50, Newburg, WI 53060-0006, or dropped in the Drop Box attached to the Village Hall Building anytime day or night. In addition to the completed Application Form, you will need to provide a copy of the rabies certificate for each dog you are licensing. If you require a Receipt or return of Dog License, you **must** include a self-addressed Stamped Envelope, or pick up at the Village Hall Office.

If you have moved out of the Village, or not longer have the dog(s), please let us know so we can update our records.

You have 24 hrs after the snow fall to clear the whole width of your sidewalks of snow and ice and remember you are not allowed to place your snow in the roadway at all.

Greetings from Little Village Insurance Agency, LLC

Fall is almost upon us and so are the annual enrollment periods for Medicare and ACA/Obamacare. Medicare's Annual Enrollment Period (AEP) starts October 15th and runs through December 7th, 2015. This is the time for you

to make changes to your Medicare Advantage or Part D drugs plans. If you do nothing, you will automatically be renewed into your current plan. If you decide to make a change, the new coverage will start January 1st, 2016. We always recommend shopping these coverage's each year to make sure you have the plan that best fits your needs and budget. This is extremely important when considering your drug coverage. Remember that you can switch Medicare supplements at any time during the year, but your application will be medically underwritten. People in reasonably good health will usually be approved on a new plan. At this time we have not been informed of any major changes with any of these products, but it always pays to talk to your agent or give us a call to see if there are better options out there.

The annual enrollment period for ACA/Obamacare starts November 1st and runs through January 31st, 2015. We highly recommend shopping your coverage at this time. There have been a lot of changes with these plans and it is VERY important that you work with your agent or call Little Village Insurance to go over your coverage. Some plans have been dropped, some plans have changed their provider networks so your doctor may no longer be in-network, and most plans have seen rate increase from 10%-24%. On the bright side, the marketplace is giving additional tax credits, so hopefully that will take some of the sting out of the rate increase.

Whether or not you use an agent from Little Village Insurance, we always recommend that you use an agent when enrolling in these plans. Agents know things that the general public doesn't know, and their advice is free. Recently we have seen a disturbing trend. Many people have been trying to enroll on their own and when they Google the marketplace, they are not clicking on the correct link and end up on a site that looks a lot like the federal marketplace. Unfortunately these sites do nothing but gather personal info and pass it on to numerous agents in the form of leads. You then get dozens of phone calls from agents all over the country trying to sell you their products. Some of these sites are even more malicious and it's possible to inadvertently give out personal information that you really don't want to share, so be careful or use an agent. Calling direct to the marketplace isn't recommended either since these people do not have insurance licenses, are NOT required to have background checks, and have no working knowledge of the insurance companies that they discuss over the phone. They cannot even help you look up doctors to see if they are in your network. So, since agents do not charge a fee for their services, why not use a licensed professional to help you with this complex system?

The entire building will be getting two additions. One addition is the solar electric panels on our roof. This will decrease our dependence on WE Energies for electricity. Unfortunately the business will need to use as much electricity as we produce over the amount we use. WE Energies does not allow us to sell back electricity to them over our amount we purchase. So we will be adding two additional electric car chargers to the building.

The electric car chargers bring in customers from all over Wisconsin and Illinois. We have had guest from as far as Barrington, Oconomowoc, and Manitowoc. These customers frequent our business as well as the local restaurants and Riveredge Nature Center. The electricity will be offered for free to create electrical usage. So plug-in while you are downtown.

If we produce more power than we use in a single year, WE Energies will disconnect solar panels. WE Energies is trying to decrease the amount of customer generated power in the system so they can expand their coal power plant. The business will also be charged per solar panel monthly for WE Energies loss of revenue. In spite of all that, the panels should pay for themselves in five years. The panels are rated with a guaranteed 30 year life span and projected 60 years of use.

Many activities are taking place inside the building. Carol and Linda are writing religious Icons. Adam is repairing computers. Paul has a full slate of business customers that takes him around southeast Wisconsin

We have had a busy summer! Seems like this is the year for reunions. Several different families who had been guests at Welcome HOME 16 years ago when we first opened our doors returned this summer. While AT&T Telephone Pioneers who helped construct Welcome HOME 18 years ago came back for a volunteer workday.

One of the return families includes twins, now 30-years old. Both the girls are living with CP, depending on power wheelchairs for mobility. For some folks living with physical disability travel is not easy for any number of reasons... ranging from physical discomfort during travel time to the need for specialized equipment that is not readily available to them any place but in their own home environment. Consequently overnight travel is not something families do routinely. So, when they do venture out on an overnight trek it is very special.

Kids spent hours chasing through the mowed maze in the prairie. Feel free to stop up and experience the

Welcome HOME grounds for yourself. (No dogs, please). You never know what you will see.

The prairie was home to a doe and her twin fawns this summer. When least expected the fawns popped up from their hiding spot in the long grasses and ran off. (Had they stayed still we never would have known they were there). As they charged toward the safety of the woods a startled family of turkeys, which were also hunkered down in the tall grasses, burst into the air. What a commotion a dozen flustered turkeys make when they fly to the treetops in unison!

Welcome HOME Bed and Breakfast is open to the public. ALL funds earned from the B&B support the 501(c)3 nonprofit program - Welcome House Of Modification Examples, Inc. With a house that is 17 years old things are starting to need major repairs or replacement (furnace, cook top, water softener, cedar deck, shifting asphalt driveway...) so we need all the income we can generate in order to continue our efforts of enriching the lives of others!

Tours (group or individual) of our wheelchair-friendly design home are offered by appointment, free of charge. This is an opportunity to explore different ideas to see what may work best for your needs, capabilities and family. We'll spend as much (or as little) time with you as you desire. We're here to help - just let us know how we may best do that for you.

Welcome, HOME is still operated entirely by volunteers. We have no paid staff. On Saturday, October 17th Welcome, HOME will benefit from the St. Luke's Church - Slinger Volunteer Blitz. We're hoping for a nice, dry autumn day so this crew can put the house and grounds to bed for the winter. The Wednesday Morning Retired Guys are still going strong - as strong as mid-70, late-80 and 92-year old retired fellows go. You may have seen them on CBS 58's Sunday Morning TV show recently!
