

In order to vote at this fall's election, whether in person or by absentee, you **MUST** now provide a valid photo ID. The key change is the dis-allowance of open drinking on any public property or public parking lot between the hours of 11:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M. Recreational Fires

Over the past year the Law Enforcement Committee has been looking into changing Village Ordinance 9.12 to permit recreational open fires in residential yards. This issue came about because of a problem in one of our neighborhoods last year. I have researched various other communities with ordinances permitting regulated open recreational burning and with the help of the Law Enforcement Committee we drafted a workable ordinance to present to the Village Board. After much debate and many changes it has now been enacted into ordinance. It is now legal to have and use a fire pit or commercially made outdoor fire place. There are several restrictions listed below. For a complete list, if you are interested, I would suggest stopping by Village Hall and obtaining a copy of the ordinance so that if you choose to have a recreational fire you know what all the rules are. Some of the requirements are as follows:

- 1) Hours permitted are from 7:00 am to 12:00 midnight.
- 2) Only clean dry natural wood or manufactured fire logs are allowed to burn. No other materials or flammable liquids are allowed.
- 3) "Commercial Outdoor Fireplaces" must have all the lids, screens and spark arresting devices in place. If placed on a deck they must be placed on a non combustible surface

and shall not be closer than 10 feet from any combustible material or structure

- 4) Fire pits must be less than 48 inches in diameter and 6 inches below ground. They must also be lined with a non combustible material such as metal, brick, concrete or stone and be at least 25 feet from any buildings and 10 feet from any combustible materials or fences. All fires in a pit must be limited to a 5 foot flame height from the surrounding ground level.
- 5) Fires must be at least a minimum of 6 feet from the property line.
- 6) Fires must be personally attended at all times. It may be attended by someone who is at least 16 years old as long as an adult is somewhere on the property.
- 7) No fires will be allowed when weather conditions make it unsafe or wind carries smoke into your neighbor's windows.
- 8) There must also be some type of tools /equipment or water immediately available to extinguish the fire at all times while burning.

The Fall Leaf burning ordinance remains unchanged.

***Welcome, HOME* - A Bed & Breakfast
In a House of wheelchair accessible Modification
Examples.**

At Welcome, House of Modification Examples, Inc. – Welcome HOME - summer passed by much too quickly, again!

Our straw bale gardens provided a bounty of fresh produce – carrots, parsnips, red beets, tomatoes, zucchini, eggplant, peppers, green and red beans, pea pods dill, basil, parsley. Gardening from a wheelchair could not have been easier. Next summer we may expand our garden beyond 4 bales.

There seemed to be two themes at Welcome HOME this summer. Both totally related to the mission envisioned over 25 years ago when this unique venture began. The mission statement of Welcome HOME is actually quite simple - "Enrich the lives of individuals and families living with disability". Accomplishing this seemingly simple task is not always void of complications.

We were approached by several different groups of people. Each group had banded together in an effort to help friends modify their homes to meet the new needs of a family member who is suddenly physically disabled. A few of these groups toured the house together. Some arranged to tour individually to better meet their schedules. Others came for several group visits armed with cameras, tape measures and tentative plans for their project – yes one WAS scribbled on a napkin. They'd tour a room, gather around a table as a group to brainstorm and make decisions, then move on to the next room.

The bathroom is the most typical challenge, followed by a bedroom and kitchen. Space in a remodeling situation always seems to be tight. The needs of both the individual and the caregiver do not always result in the same design. The unknown of the future presents another complication. How capable or challenged will all the involved family members be next year – in 3 years – after the kids leave for college (or want to move home again)?

We are here to offer whatever assistance we know how to. We can show visitors the different accessible design examples located throughout Welcome HOME; share our experiences (both good and maybe not the best) with an array of adaptive equipment we have on hand (the majority of which has been donated to us); offer suggestions on where they can find items to purchase or contractors to assist with accessible design remodeling. A question that is always asked is "where can they find funding to help defray the costs?" Sadly, we have no answer for that.

The second theme was families. Many of our summer B&B guests were extended families. Several were three generations coming together for different events – a family reunion, a wedding, a couple of birthday celebrations and sadly a funeral. Most often it was a grandparent who was able to join the family because Welcome HOME provided the accessible accommodation they need. Other times it was a parent to young children. On one occasion it

was twin pre-teens, who having been born with Cerebral Palsy, were mobile via power wheelchairs. Now that was a weekend filled with a whirlwind of motion and giggles!

Indoor winter archery Leagues will start Monday January 5th (first week is practice). We have team openings on Monday, Tuesday, Friday and Saturday kids, or get on a waiting list for a certain night. Older more experienced kids shoot earlier and the younger less experienced shoot later times. Times run from 8 to noon, and shooting from 10 to 27 yards, with a balloon shoot and party at the end.
