'It's a beautiful day in Newburg'

As most of you are aware, Newburg has a new park on the south end of the Village named Grotelueschen Presidents Park. The primary entrance to the park is Concord Court going south off Steeple View Road. This access area is not paved however you may park on the village owned grass area weather permitting. There are picnic tables and benches for your use. Please respect the private property of the neighboring home owners. Do not enter the park through their property. The village is considering developing the park further with a possible pavilion and toddler play area through a fundraiser this winter. There will be more on the possible development fundraiser in the next newsletter.

As previously noted, the village has gone from two Board meetings a month down to one with the addition of a Committee of the Whole meeting. The Board still meets on the second Thursday while the Committee of the Whole now meets on the fourth Thursday. The Committee of the Whole consists of sub committees of Department of Public Works, Sanitary Sewer, Law Enforcement, and Personnel and Finance. Both meetings start at 7:00 P.M. Please come and join us at a meeting.

Also coming up is the re-codification of the village ordinances. Along with this re-codification the village will offer access to its code online. Hopefully this new online service will be more accommodating to everyone's busy schedule. This process will take six to nine months to complete.

The updated village website is now up and running. It is a work in progress. We welcome not only suggestions as to what you would like to see or have links to through our site but also photos you have of the Newburg community you would like to share. Please email your photos to me at rgoeckner@village.newburg.wi.us. The village's recently updated Comprehensive Plan, 2014 version, is now available through a linked access point on the site.

US Congressman Sensenbrenner will have office hours at Newburg Village Hall September 15th at 9:00 A.M. This past year Sensenbrenner had a packed house at one of his sessions. Once again, please come join us. Sensenbrenner is here to not only give us an update of what is going on in Washington, D.C. but also try to answer any questions you may have at the federal level. If available State Senator Stroebel as well as State Representative Brooks will also be in attendance during these office hours to answer your questions.

Village Hall will hopefully have new election equipment by 2016. Staff has been participating in county wide demonstrations by various election equipment vendors. This new equipment will be purchased by Washington and Ozaukee Counties (with some financial participation by the village). Our current equipment is over 20 years old and the hardware is no longer supported. Our poll workers are looking forward to new touch screen machines.

The village's newest member on the Board is Trustee Amy Juech. I'm sure Amy will be happy to hear from you on any village matter.

Village Hall will be closed for the 4th of July holiday on Friday July 3rd. Please use our night drop box attached to the building should you have any payment you need to make.

Finally, what another great picnic sponsored and hosted by the Newburg Fire Department. I am already looking forward to next year's picnic. Hopefully they will not run out of shrimp so early at their Friday night fish fry!

Newburg Police Department *By Tim Buege, Chief of Police*

The summer season is upon us. Another Newburg Fireman's Picnic has passed. This year's picnic went very well. The crowds were low in number and those attending were fairly well behaved. There are, however, some issues that came up during the picnic weekend and need to be addressed. These issues are the proper places for the consumption of intoxicants, beer, wine and hard liquor. It is illegal at all times to consume alcohol on public property. Public property includes all village parks without a permit, Village sidewalks, public streets and highways. There were reports of parade participants consuming intoxicants, and some spectators handing some drivers of parade vehicles alcoholic beverages. This behavior is not allowed and is strongly discouraged.

The questions that come up are; where can I consume intoxicants legally? The answer is on private property, excluding the sidewalk area along the roadway, or at a licensed premise, such as a tavern or the Fireman's Park, which is a licensed premise. You can also apply for a temporary permit to allow consumption of beer at a local park if you are planning a family picnic or gathering.

Can I carry in intoxicants from home at these licensed places? The answer is no you may not. These establishments are licensed to sell intoxicants, some for beer alone and some for beer, wine and hard liquor for consumption on the premises. These intoxicants must be consumed on the premises and it is illegal to carry in your own alcoholic beverages into or onto their premises. Also note that some taverns and stores like Tri-Par sell alcohol in closed containers for consumption off premises. These are sold in sealed containers and it is illegal to open and consume them on the premises. They are for you to take home and consume elsewhere.

You use the term "Licensed Premises" what does that mean? Licensed premises means a place that has a license to serve either beer, wine, intoxicating liquor or all three depending on the license type that is granted. Each license that is granted will have the locations where alcohol may be consumed clearly defined on their License and their license must be prominently displayed in their establishment. If you remove the open intoxicants from those locations, like for instance, out the front door and down the sidewalk both you and the bar tender or owners are in violation of the law and could receive a citation.

I am hopeful that this article will help everyone understand the State of Wisconsin Liquor laws a little bit better. I also ask for you to help me by letting your friends know the way to drink responsibly and properly to make Newburg a better and safer place to live.

THANK YOU Newburg Lioness Club for your latest donation to Welcome HOME! It sure came at the right time. We have a battery operated Hoyer lift used to assist transfer folks out of their wheelchairs to bed, shower chairs, toilet... The lift is cumbersome to transport in a van, yet it is a vital tool in the daily lives of a number of our guests, so they rely on our lift when they are here. The \$230 battery "died" a couple of days before one of those guests was coming for a several night stay. We found a vendor in Texas who could overnight ship the battery to us so we were good to go just hours before he arrived!

As the woods come alive after the winter months everything seems to be particularly productive. Blooming plants have vivid colors and an abundance of flowers. Maple tree seedlings are popping up everywhere. And the poison ivy is in high-volume.

STAY on the trails to avoid it.

We invite you (sorry, dogs are not invited) to enjoy our grounds where you will find a variety of things to do. Stroll the wheelchair-friendly trails in the woods and prairie where you'll find benches along the way for relaxing or reading. Don't be frightened by the commotion of a turkey you may startle taking flight. On my recent evening walk I spotted a doe with her small twins. They were walking on the trail, too. Look for the two Goecaches hidden in the woods.

Borrow A Book - Trade A Book - Donate A Book. We use cinnamon to discourage ants from taking up residence in the Delores Kornblum Memorial Little Free Library. It might look odd - but it won't hurt you. Actually, it'll make the books smell good.

You'll find picnic tables in several locations. We purposely do not have trash containers! After enjoying your meal or snack, please, take your trash home with

you. Be courteous of others. If someone forgot to pick up their litter - be a good neighbor and do it for them.

LEAVE YOUR DOGS AT HOME! The ONLY dogs allowed on the Welcome HOME grounds are Cinnamon and Charlie (who live at Welcome HOME) and dogs (many of which are service dogs - not pets) of Welcome HOME guests.

1. No roller blades, skates, bikes allowed on Welcome HOME trails.

2. Do not pick or remove anything (other than litter) - living or not - from the Welcome HOME grounds. This includes deer antlers that have been shed, flowers, frogs, and salamanders, fruit from the trees or vines, fossils and rocks...

3. Stay on the trails or mowed areas.
